


Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen. Luke 24:5

OLMC TRANSFER RITUAL

On Tuesday 18th October 2021 Mercy Partners welcomed Our Lady of Mercy College Parramatta into the Mercy Partners family. Due to Covid restrictions the ritual of transfer was delayed until Sunday 13 March 2022.

The Transfer of Governance Ceremony of Our Lady of Mercy College Parramatta from Canonical Sponsorship of the Sisters of Mercy Parramatta to Mercy Partners was celebrated with Sisters of Mercy, many of them former students, teachers and leaders, current board, staff and students, the Mercy Partners Council and many friends in mercy.

As Mary-Louise Petro rsm, Congregation Leader, Sister of Mercy Parramatta said, "Today is all about journey. It is about the whole thread from the journey that began with Catherine McAuley, right through the ages and continuing through to today."

Those in attendance gathered on OLMC ground, a place of Mercy sacred to countless generations of the Darug people and blessed by the gifts of those who have lived, worked and learnt there. Aunty Julie Webb welcomed all to Country and blessed the ground painting by Ngemba artist, Danny Eastwood depicting the ongoing connection of the Darug people and the contribution of the women religious who have lived and worked at OLMC.

This traditional Aboriginal artwork aptly name,
The Journey, marked the beginning of the transfer
ceremony. The procession continued carrying
Parramatta River water and candles to the 'Come, Sit
Awhile' Sculpture of Catherine McAuley. Here the story
of Catherine McAuley was retold, a candle gifted to

the Parramatta Sisters by the Callan Community was lit and small rocks painted by OLMC students were distributed to the Sisters of Mercy in attendance.

After adding water from the 'Rill' (a small watercourse in the back garden of Mercy International Centre) to the Parramatta River water, it was carried with the Callan candle to the Mother Mary Clare Dunphy Memorial Chapel. Here the founding st, ory of the Parramatta Sisters of Mercy was shared. Mary Louise Petro also shared the journey to the transfer of ownership to Mercy Partners, "We have come to this wonderful place, this new life for OLMC with Mercy Partners and we are delighted! We can sing that our souls in fact are joyful. Even though we know we have tears of sadness, and we all recognise those, it is a wonderful space to be, to be so sure that OLMC has found the best home. A home that is welcoming of us as well and a realisation we are giving over nothing except having to do the work and we are now the grandmothers who enjoy OLMC as it journeys into the future."

The final element of the ritual was a procession to the Mercy Tree where water from the Brisbane River joined the blended waters from the Parramatta River and 'The Rill', Mercy International, Dublin and the formal transfer proceedings began.

In her address, Kerrie Walshaw, OLMC Board Chair observed, "Today, we are sharing in a part of OLMC's rich journey.

"Our short walk through the college and convent grounds have told the stories of the paths we have travelled.

"As you have heard already, in 1889 OLMC was founded by our brave sisters who travelled from Callan







Ireland. Since that time for 133 years OLMC has been on its own journey.

"Now in 2022 we are reaching another major milestone with the canonical sponsorship of OLMC transferring from our beloved Sisters to Mercy Partners."

In her address, Ricki Jeffery, Chairperson, Mercy Partners Council, noted, "It has been a privilege to hear the story of this sacred place, of this school and of the Congregation of the Sisters of Mercy here in Parramatta, enacted through the words, prayers, song and actions of this ritual."

"It is humbling in so many ways to be stepping onto such a well-worn path of mercy, to be receiving in trust this college which has been such an important ministry of the Sisters of Mercy, to be part of the 'Muru Ba' – the future pathway."

The final ritual included the pouring of the onto the Mercy Tree by Lucie Farrugia (Principal OLMC), Maria Lawton rsm (Congregation Vicar, Sisters of Mercy Parramatta), and Kieran McCarthy (Deputy Chair and Company Secretary, Mercy Partners).

Congregation Leader, Mary Louise Petro rsm, concluded the official proceedings with the presentation of hand carved walnut bowls to the College, the congregation and Mercy partners. The walnut tree is a rich symbol from the life of Catherine McAuley and the bowls are a wonderful link between all stages of the journey.

As Mary Louise Petro rsm said, "We decided what would be a nice thing to do was to have something that came from the OLMC walnut tree and the thread that went all the way back to Catherine McAuley sitting beneath the walnut tree and discerning her future and for the future of those who were poor and vulnerable."

AMPIP INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

Mercy Partners Chair Dr Ricki Jeffery spoke at the Association of Ministerial PJPs International Women's Day as a panel member on the webinar.

Her address interrogated the need for women to claim ecclesial leadership in Church ministries. "I found it interesting that this is a topic at all, that is the specifying of women in PJP Governance." Leaders in Governance, like anyone making a valuable contribution to society, should be celebrated as such; people who go out of their way to make an impact. No gender labels. No labels whatsoever.

Ricki commented, "To my cynical self it suggests that there has not been (and in some cases continues not to be) a valuing of the role of women in this space - and that women are latecomers to governance roles, maybe even grudging inclusions.

"However, I believe this is not the case – many of the ministries of Mercy Partners for instance were founded, led and staffed by women religious and later lay leaders who have taken up ministry leadership – canonical and civil - and have been in the forefront of canonical governance as stewards, trustees and ecclesial leaders in mission and formation."

As the Mercy Partners Theological Framework asserts: Since the earliest days of the Church, Christians have gathered in communities of different kinds, expressing their faith in liturgy and sacrament, in friendship and service, whether in households, hospitals, prisons, schools or church buildings. Drawing on the Gospel for inspiration, these communities still today express the presence of Jesus in the world in unique ways. (Mercy Partners Theological Framework, p3)

Ricki went on to say, "Recognising the place of women (and men) in the Church, in the multitude of places where faith has led to action for those made poor, those marginalised, those in need of support, has been to acknowledge that mission is an equal opportunity 'space'.

"What's often missing is the courage of women to stand up and embrace ecclesial leadership – to see themselves as equals at all levels of leadership and governance – to claim for themselves the title 'ecclesial leader', without bowing before male leadership or being pushed or ignored into voicelessness.

Even though women have been doing the job (mission) and building highly successful ministries in health, education, family services, etc they are often operating in a 'gender unfriendly' environment:

- Clericalism in the Church has often not recognised either the gifts or the achievements of women
- Corporate cultures privilege power politics, boy's clubs, and often misogynistic practices
- Social constraints have consigned women's work to the home
- There has been a reluctance to honour those approaches to leadership and governance which are deemed feminine – flexibility, collaboration, empowerment, consensus thinking. These were the attributes of women like Nano Nagle and Catherine McAuley who stood up to bullying by Church leaders who wanted to control their work.

Sr Raphael Consedine writes of Nano Nagle (founder of the Presentation Sisters):

With the creative energy of the Spirit in their hearts, they went into situations of deep material and spiritual poverty in and beyond Ireland and transformed them into situations of hope... The pioneering spirit was manifest not only in going to new places but being ready to attempt new forms of service, new methods in established works. The readiness to push against accepted boundaries for the sake of service to people has continued to express itself in new situations, in changing cultures and with changing needs. (Consedine, 1988, P.97).

"In truth," Ricki concluded, "women have often been socialised into believing that they don't have a role at certain levels of Church leadership and its suits some male leaders to reinforce this in direct and sometimes more subtle and indirect ways. Today, International Womens' Day is a day to celebrate the leadership of women in the Church and society more broadly, and to encourage all women to embrace leadership, to speak up for those who are vulnerable and to honour the legacy of the strong women who have founded our ministries.

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



MISSION LEADERSHIP IN THE FUTURE

Mercy Partners recognises that the authentic Catholic identity of Catholic ministries is premised on strong and strategic formation for mission. To this end Mercy Partners are working with other agencies to examine options for developing mission leaders into the future. This role, previously supported by Church agencies and religious congregations, who invested heavily in formation, now falls to lay organisations such as Public Juridic Persons.

Mercy Partners will continue to engage in sector-wide conversations and strategic planning to realise a Formation Institute, supported and funded by Catholic agencies. This initiative will allow our Catholic ministries to build capacity and support mission leadership into the future. This initiative calls for genuine collaboration between MPJPs, other Church agencies and the wider Catholic community.


PASTORAL CARE GATHERING
